Key knowledge

Ancient Greece is often referred to as 'the birthplace of western civilization'

The roles of men and women were different and only men were involved in government and permitted to take part in the Olympic Games

The Athenian definition of citizens was different from modem-day citizens and included only free men (women, children and slaves were not considered citizens and therefore couldn't vote)

Ancient Greece produced political ideas, art, architecture, sculpture, mathematical and scientific theories, engineering, philosophy and literature that influence our lives today

Ancient Greeks can be credited with many inventions and discoveries.

They invented democracy, the Olympics, theatre and were great orators



776 BC First Olympic Games held in Olympia

750 BC Early Greek culture thrived. Homer writes The Iliad and The Odyssey

570 BC Pythagoras was born s he made major breakthroughs in science and maths

508 BC democracy began in Athens giving greater power to the people

146 BC Rome conquered Greece making it part of the Roman Empire
