What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	All but 3 children can swim 15m - 95% of Y6 can swim 15m	We are lucky enough to have access to a pool that's within our academy trust. Swimming lessons are generally consistent but there are occasions where the pool is not available due to maintenance issues. To help reduce issues with the pool we applied for funding to replace old/failing equipment.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	All but 3 children can swim 15m - 95% of Y6 can swim 15m	We were limited to the number of TOPs sessions available to our Year 6 cohort this year due to pool availability. This has had significant impact upon our attainment. Due to the limited Y6 TOPs sessions, we made the decision to focus on the 3 non swimmers and give them priority in the sessions available. Moving forward to 2024 – 2025 Year 3 and Year 4 sessions will be reduced to ensure Year 6

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different waterbased situations?	70%	Children at Shiphay swim in Year 3 and again in Year 4. Those children who are yet to meet the national swimming standards then receive TOPs swimming in Y6 if necessary. Year 5 pupils trained as Water Safety Leaders delivering assemblies across the school to promote water safety.
